



Grants for Education

Agastya International Foundation

Location(s): Alibaug, Maharashtra and Howrah, West Bengal

Agastya empowers economically disadvantaged rural and urban children through hands-on learning in science concepts. Agastya supports the training of teachers in pedagogy who in turn effectively assist remedial students and dropouts. Agastya has a presence in 22 states, reaching more than 2. 5 lakh teachers and 1.2 crore children.

GOALS

To **spark curiosity** in students in the field of science by providing sustainable and **practical hands-on education** in government schools in rural areas.

To conduct **Science Fairs, Summer Camps,** and **Community Visits** to encourage students to explore and develop an understanding of scientific concepts.

To conduct relevant **training for teachers**.

ACTIVITIES

- Agastya reached 5,676 students (3,377 in Alibaug and 2,299 in Howrah) with 1,555 hands-on science sessions, providing over 25,000 exposures (more than four per student). Students from grades 6 to 10 performed experiments to understand gravity, friction, atoms, and molecules.
- 8 Science Fairs were conducted, enabling 3,300 students (58% of total students), 314 Young Instructor Leader (YILs) to showcase their learnings and present innovative solutions to real-world problems. 206 teachers also participated in these sessions.
- **6,800 students** participated in **30 summer camps** that offered art and craft activities and low-cost model-making lessons.
- 368 community visits were conducted, reaching nearly 9,300 students and 7,400 community members. These visits, which often involved multiple interactions, focused on exploring human body parts such as the brain, bone joints, and the torso.
- Three training programs were conducted for **121 teachers** to enhance their skills and teaching methods to improve student learning outcomes.

EdelGive Foundation: Collaborators for Transforming Education (CTE)

Location(s): 36 districts across Maharashtra

The Collaborators for Transforming Education (CTE) is a unique public-private partnership model launched in 2016 by the EdelGive Foundation to support the Government of Maharashtra's Quality Education Program to solve the multifaceted problems hindering the quality of learning among students by bringing reforms at a systemic level. This program is carried out in collaboration with three NGO partners: Quality Education Support Trust (QUEST), Gyan Prakash Foundation (GPF), and Kaivalya Education Foundation (KEF).

The program **empowers stakeholders**, like teachers, head teachers, Gram Sabhas, Zila Parishads, Shikshan Parishads, communities, and various government officials, to create a supportive learning environment for students, foster lasting positive learning outcomes, and improve existing processes.

The program has three phases:

Phase I: School Transformation Program (STP) Phase II: District Transformation Program (DTP) Phase III: State Transformation Program (StTP)

After successfully implementing STP, the Collaborators have focused on consolidating the achievements of DTP, and in **July 2023 launched** the third and final phase, the **State Transformation Program.**

Collaborators for Transforming Education (CTE)/ Quality Education Support Trust (QUEST)

Location(s): 36 districts across Maharashtra

QUEST envisions an egalitarian society where everyone leads a dignified life. With a mission to enrich the learning experiences of under-served children, they have become a beacon of educational transformation in the region. The organisation builds innovative solutions for early childhood and elementary education with a dedicated team that strives to interpret and effectively implement government policies.

GOALS

Provide support to the state in reviewing and finalizing the State Curriculum Framework for Foundational Stage (SCF-FS) and the School Education (SCF-SE).

Change the **definition of home language** under SCF-FS.

Design a 6-month online course for Anganwadi workers (AWWs) and draft the module for Early Language Literacy and Numeracy instruction. And design a manual for this course.

ACTIVITIES

- Review of each draft of SCF-FS was completed.
- Participated in the **development**, review, and finalization of SCF-SE.
- The definition of L1 (medium of instruction) in the SCF-FS was changed to the home language of the majority of students in the region. This change was made to avoid negligence of students' home language in the classroom.
- Participated in a review of the **pilot for the 6-month online course** for AWWs and incorporated the learnings into the course.
- Participated in designing a one-year Diploma course for AWWs.
- Designed the Contact session for the Training of Teachers (TOT) for the 6-month course for AWWs for Master trainers at the state level.


EdelGive Uses Results Based Management-Monitoring Framework

5. MANAGE AND USE EVALUATION

The focus is on the measurement of short and long-term results (outcome & impact) to ascertain the effectiveness of the intervention. Results are used for required course correction.

4. IMPLEMENT AND USE MONITORING

Focused on execution of intervention plan and monitoring as per the plan devised. Monitoring data is used in decision-making. Largely measurement of inputs, activities, and outputs is done at this stage.



1. DEFINE IMPACT

This stage focuses on defining the program's Goals and Objectives; formulating the strategies to achieve them; organizing or creating the means required.

2. DEFINE RESULTS CHAIN

The focus is on defining a results chain. The basic principle of results planning is to start with the desired change (impact and outcomes) and then identify the outputs, activities, and inputs required to achieve them – develop a results framework

3. PLANNING FOR M&E

The focus is on developing a monitoring and evaluation plan, identifying indicators, and data sources, developing data collection tools, data quality checklist and mitigation plan, measurements, and quality control of activities to achieve high efficiency by directing all steps in their proper sequence.
